The original and each copy of an application for a passport must have attached to it a copy of the applicant's photograph.  
A loose signed photograph of the applicant must accompany the application.  
The photograph must be on thin paper, should have a light background, and be not over three inches in size.

This blank must be completely filled out. The legal fee of nine dollars, in currency or postal money order, must accompany the application.  
A woman's application must state whether she is married or not, and a married woman must state whether her husband is a native citizen.  
The rules should be carefully read before mailing the application to the Department of State, Division of Passport Control, Washington, D. C.

Dear Mr. Brist:

There seems to be no question as to the American citizenship of LILLIAN SCOTT TROY. It appears that she was born in this country, and there is nothing to show that she has ever obtained naturalization in a foreign country, or taken a foreign oath of allegiance.

The Secretary of State undoubtedly has authority to refuse, in his discretion, to issue a passport to Miss Troy. Also he has authority, in his discretion, to require Miss Troy to show to his satisfaction what is the object of her proposed trip to Germany, Switzerland and Italy. Whether the Secretary should (1) refuse to grant a passport to Miss Troy because of the evidence in the attached files concerning previous implication in Irish agitation, etc.; or (2) require Miss Troy to explain the object of her proposed trip abroad seem to be questions of policy rather than questions of law. Perhaps you might wish to consult Mr. Armour before making definite recommendations to the Secretary. It appears that some of the attached files came from Mr. Armour's office, so that he probably has some knowledge concerning the facts of this case.

I may add that I have some knowledge of this case because of the mention of Miss Troy in reports concerning Baron von Horst, which I read some years ago, but have not had occasion to examine the subsequent reports.

Dear Mr. Valance:

Please note the 2d memorandum of December 26, attached. In this application Lillian Scott Troy applies for a passport for only the following countries:

Germany,  
Switzerland,,  
Italy.

She does not mention France nor the British Isles. In issuing the passport we can follow our usual practice in making it good for "All countries" or we can name just those countries which she asks for. In case the passport reads "All countries" we can safely leave the problem of the British visa to British officials because the British themselves are judges of whom should be given a visa for the purpose of enabling them to enter British territory.

Miss Troy is an American citizen and therefore entitled to the usual protection accorded an American while abroad. One evidence of the right of protection is a passport. Mr. Flournoy is thoroughly conversant with the principles governing these cases and you may wish to discuss the case with him.
