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MR. MOSTYN PIGOTT  
"THE PLACE TO DIED IN."

"I am going down to Ramsgate die," he told me, 'and a damned decent place to die.' He has kept his word. He always did."

This is an extract from an appreciation which appeared in a London journal, ever the initials "P.P." concerning Mr. Montague Horatio Mostyn Turtle Pigott, M.A., B.C.L., who died at Denham House Nursing Home, Ramsgate, on Friday, from chest trouble.

Mr. Mostyn Pigott, who was in his 62nd year, was brilliant man of letters, and was perhaps best known at Ramsgate for his connection with the Royal Temple Yacht Club, and his regular attendance at musical performances of quality. A real Bohemian, he was famous after-dinner speaker. The old friend from whose memoir Mr. Mostyn Pigott we quote above, writes: "Mostyn, like many greater, though not more brilliant man, lived and spoke his wisdom, but did not write it."

A son of Dr. Turtle Pigott. D.C.L., he was a Barrister of the Middle Temple. He was educated at Westminster and University College, Oxford, obtaining second-class honours in Classical Moderations and Law. For ten years he coached pupils for the Bar examinations, and among the most notable of those whom instructed were F. K. Smith (now Lord Birkenhead and ex-Lord Chancellor), P. Warner, Lord Amphill, and H.H. Irving.

He was founder and first editor the "Isis," and under the pen-name "Medium Tem Plum" he wrote many clever contributions. He had finely-pointed wit that found happy expression in light, polished verse. He had written plays, and, while his work was characterised by considerable felicity satirical expression, his kindly nature ensured the deep affection of his friends, who will, while mourning his loss, long treasure the memory a human soul.

Mr. Mostyn [Turtle] Pigott was popular member of the Savage Club and the Beefsteak Club.

Memorial and Funeral.

A memorial service for Mr. Pigott was held Tuesday, at the Church St. The Rev. H. L. Johnston officiated (Jrieg's Funeral March was played, with Mr. Philip Page at the organ, and the Salisbury Singers rendered "The Cong Day Closes."

Among those present were Sir Alexander Mackenzie, Sir P. Colville Smith. Grand Secretary of the United Lodge English Freemasons, feir H. Cassie Holden, Mr. Alex. J. Warden, Mr. Malcolm Hoberts, Mr. Francis P. Stopford, and Sir Somers Vine.

There was a large gathering of members the Savage Club, with which Mr. had been associated for over thirty years. They included Sir Basil Clarke, Major G. T. Harley Thomas, Capt. J. Bell White. Flannagan represented the club officials.

On Wednesday, in the beautifully-kept cemetery at Tunbridge Wells, the remains of the late Mr. Mostyn Pigott were laid to rest in a grave adjoining that of his father and mother.

The service was conducted by The Rev. Frank Houghton, and the graveside there were many well-known literary men, members of the Savage, Beefsteak, and Royal Temple Yacht (. tubs, old friends the legal profession, and others.

The attendance included Mr. J. J. and Mr. F. H. Gorle (representing the Savage Club), Mr. N. Gambier, Col. A. T. Simpson, Mr. U. Hillard, Mr. A. P. King, Mr. A. Clutterbuck and Dr. A. L. Johnston (the two last-named representing the Royal Temple Yacht Club, from Ramsgnte)

Mr. Mostyn Pigott's only sister, Mrs. Gilbert Williams, who is in South Africa, was represented A. S. Grant, who also represented Mr. Joseilh Sharpe.

Mrs. Williams sent a floral emblem, bearing the word sin "in affectionate remembrance, from Else." Other tributes came from: Mr. and Mrs. George Marshall; J. Murray Allison; the Savage Club ("With deepest sympathy "); the Athlumney Chapter of Rose Crois, No. 164 ("With deep regret"); Animanol; Flag Officers and Members of the Royal Temple Yacht Club "With deepest sympathy —W. Rochelle, Ramsgate secretary"); Joseph Sharpen "to my dear old friend, Mostyn"; and Dr. Johnston ("From an old friend").

The oak coffin, with brass fittings, simply bore his name, age, and date of death.

Messrs. W. P. Blackburnand Son of Ramsgate, carried out the funeral arrangements.

The cortege left Ramsgate at ten o'clock on Wednesday morning.
