## STATE BUDGET PASSED, GOES TO CONFERENCE

Assembly Clears Way for Swift Action on Measure

EXAMINER BUREAU: SAC RAYMOND. March 22—By a vote of sixteen to one, the assembly committee on governmental efficiency today recommended repeal of the Collier Lobby Regulation Act and the passage of the Erwin bill as a substitute.

Both houses now have passed their own version of the measure, which totaled \$71,415,944, when it came from the Governor's desk. The Assembly vote was 65 to 12, with George D. Collins Jr. and Bernard Brady of San Francisco among the Democratic dissenters.

### WAY CLEARED

The lower house way, and means committee cleared the way for speedy reference of the subject to a free conference committee by amending the assembly version of the budget into the bill passed by the senate yesterday.

Senator William P. Rich, finance committee chairman, said the senate will defer action on the assembly budget pending return of its own assembly-amended bill, then refuse to concur in lower house amendments. Such a course may find the budget in free conference committee by tomorrow night.

"This is not a good budget, and it is not a true budget," argued Democratic Floor Leader Julian Beck of San Francisco.

**EXAMPLE CITED**—He said the ways and means committee, in addition to analyzing expenditures, should have carefully sifted accompanying revenue estimates to see "whether it actually is in balance because the revenues are not accurately portrayed."

"For example, the revenue projections show \$33,000,000 accruing from sales and use taxes, while the legislative auditor says all he can see is \$327,000,000," Beck said.

One of the major points of senate assembly difference will be lower house insertion of \$6,000,000 for financing child care centers another year, until June 30, 1951. The Governor did not include this item, but opened his special session agenda to permit its consideration.

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## Substitute Lobby Bill Approved in Assembly

EXAMINER BUREAU: SAC RAYMOND. March 22—By a vote of sixteen to one, the assembly committee on governmental efficiency today recommended repeal of the Collier Lobby Regulation Act and the passage of the Erwin bill as a substitute.

The first day of the Collier Act meanwhile, found Capitol lobbies almost clear of lobbyists. Among the early registrants was San Francisco's legislative representative Deland W. Clary, who declared his employment was contractual, that his salary is \$12,000, and that he has a \$15,000 annual expense account. The assembly rules committee today again discussed the Collier resolution barring Arthur H. Samish from registering as a lobbyist, then deferred action until a report has been received from the committee on government efficiency.

**PROBABLE CHARGE**—Assemblyman John L. E. Collier bitterly protested the committee's "do pass" recommendation, defended his own measure as "simple and crystal clear," and angrily declared:

"I can see that there has been a terrible amount of lobby pressure on the committee to get this special meeting called."

Collier's bill was passed at the special session last December. The proposed substitute is approved by the joint interim committee on lobbying, headed by Assemblyman Thomas A. Erwin, Puente Republican.

Erwin told the committee the Collier bill was found by the committee, after hearing testimony

He added: "I am proud to have been selected by the people of California to represent them in the United States Senate."

He also declared that he would be glad to accept the nomination of either party.

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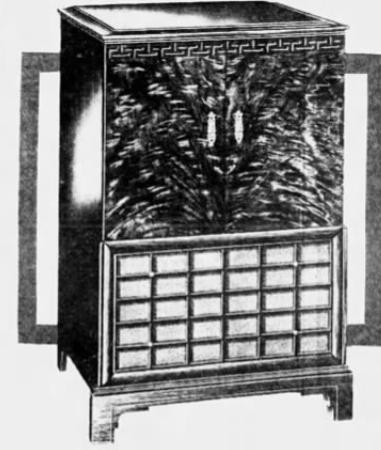
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
