The ISSA Awards

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Rewarding Those Who Contribute to Peace and Human Progress

The International Strategic Studies Association began, in 1983, the process of making *Awards for Outstanding Contributions to Strategic Progress* to individuals who, by their leadership, had advanced the cause of international peace and the progress of their own, and other, nations. Throughout the years since their foundation, the ISSA Awards have been presented to a number of world leaders. On two occasions, the Association has named special Awards in honor of Dr Stefan T. Possony (1915-1995), one of the founders of ISSA, who had been called "the greatest strategic philosopher of the 20th Century". Those Awards were made to individuals who had made their contribution through Science and Technology.

In 1997, the Association transformed the Awards — which had been represented in the past by certificates and different engraved silver dishes or bowls — into an Order in two grades: the *Gold Star Award for Outstanding Contributions to Strategic Progress*, and the *Silver Star Award for Outstanding Contributions to Strategic Progress*. In doing this, ISSA called on Garrard, the Crown Jewellers, of London, to assist in designing and striking the collar medals (shown here in the Gold Star form) so as to conform with international standards of protocol.



The Gold Star Award is normally reserved for Heads-of-State, Heads-of-Government or very special cases at the discretion of the Awards Committee. The Silver Star Award is reserved for those of Cabinet-level or other levels of Government or Private Service. The Possony Prize is always presented in the form of the Silver Star.

With the creation of the system of Awards into the form of an Order, the Grand Mastership of the ISSA Awards is always the President of the Association.

In addition to receiving the Gold or Silver Medal, recipients of the ISSA Awards are also conferred with the honor of Honorary Life Membership in the Association, and with the right to join ISSA for any period they desire as Senior Research Fellows.

In recent years, however, the recipients have included:

- The Honorable Caspar W. Weinberger, former US Secretary of Defense (Gold Star), 2000;
- Vice-Admiral Ko Tun-hwa, noted geostrategist and former Vice Minister of Defense, Republic of China; currently National Policy Advisor to the President of the ROC (Taiwan) (Stefan T. Possony Prize and Silver Star), 2000;
- General the Honorable Alexander M. Haig, Jr., former US Secretary of State, and former Supreme Allied Commander, Europe, of NATO (Gold Star), 1997;
- His Majesty King Kigeli V, the *Umwami w'u Rwanda* (King of Rwanda), for his work in helping to warn of the coming genocides in his country and region (Gold Star), 1998;
- The Honorable Bill McCollum, US Congressman from Florida, for his work in international security (Silver Star), 1998;
- The Honorable Jim Saxton, US Congressman from New Jersey, for his work in international security (Silver Star), 1998;

- His Imperial Highness Prince Ermias Sahle-Selassie Haile-Selassie, President of the Crown Council of Ethiopia, for his humanitarian achievements in helping win recognition for the plight of Ethiopian refugees in the worldwide diaspora (Silver Star), 1997;
- Dr Paul Kaminski, former US Under-Secretary of Defense for Acquisitions and Technology, for his pioneering work in stealth technologies (Possony Prize; Silver Star), 1997.

Members and non-members of the Association may make recommendations to the Awards Committee, nominating for consideration any individuals they deem worthy of receipt of an ISSA Award. The Awards are normally presented at the ISSA Strategy Conference, the Global Strategic Forum, which is usually held in September-October each year, most often in Washington DC. A Special black-tie Awards Banquet is held to present the Awards.
